

12 DEAD IN 'L' ACCIDENT

Misplaced Switch Hurled Crowd of Car to Street Below.

Pension Roll Figures—Retaliatory Duties Rescinded—Was an Innocent Man Hanged?—20 Deaths in Powder Mill Explosion—Clerks Signed For Millions—Printers' Strikes.

The worst accident in the history of overhead railroads in New York came Monday morning when a southbound train on Ninth avenue was switched off to the Sixth avenue line at the 53rd street junction.

The first car swung around the right angle curve, holding to the rails because of the weight of the train behind. Then the train became too great.

For an instant the vehicle stood fairly on end. Then the sides gave way as if they were made of pasteboard, heaving out a mass of humanity.

Three alarms of fire brought many engines to the scene. A slight fire caused by burning insulation was quickly extinguished and the firemen set to work chopping out the dead and injured.

Eight persons were dead when taken out of the wreck and four died later at hospitals. Forty were injured, many seriously.

The cause of the accident and the immediate responsibility remain to be settled. The motorman of the wrecked train is a fugitive, while a switchman, conductor and four guards are under arrest.

The maximum of pension roll reached the maximum number in its history, 1,041, 196, on January 21 last. The roll passed the million mark last September.

These facts are developed in a synopsis of the annual report of Pension Commissioner Warner for the fiscal year ending June 30 last. At the end of the year the number of pensioners had declined to 928,411 a net decrease of 3,570.

During the year the bureau issued 126,242 pension certificates, over 60,000 being originals.

The annual value of the pension roll on June 30, 1905, is \$1,041,196. The term "annual value" is meant the amount of money required to pay the pensioners then on the roll for one year.

During the year 43,883 pensioners were dropped by reason of death, 20,224 being survivors of the Civil war.

The total number of claims allowed original and increase, under order No. 78, known as the "age order," since that order went into effect, April 13, 1904, up to June 1905, was 65,612.

At the conference on Saturday night between President Roosevelt and the Russian peace plenipotentiaries Mr. Witte by direction of the Emperor of Russia presented to the president the following communication:

"Some years ago in consequence of a misunderstanding in the interpretation of the most favored nation clause, there were established in Russia on several articles of American production customs duties on a higher scale than those levied on same articles when imported from other countries."

"His Majesty, the Emperor of Russia, has commanded me to inform the president of the United States that he has been pleased to order the discontinuance of the levying of such higher duties on American products in order that henceforth the American manufacturers should pay the same duties as importers from other countries."

"When my lifeless body is found by my mother, Mrs. Catherine Herzig of Girard, O. The enclosed letter will reveal my identity and the awful secret of my wretched life. I can endure it no longer."

The foregoing note was found by Frank Byer, who lives on a claim near Hidden Wood, near Minot, N. D. It was written by one of his harvest hands called Frank, who has disappeared.

"Dear Mr. Byer: In the early evening Charles Sterling, a supposed tramp, was tried for the murder of Lizzie Grumbacher, a beautiful young woman residing near Youngstown, in Mahoning county, O. He was convicted on circumstantial evidence and was hanged for the crime in the county jail at Youngstown."

"Charles Sterling was an innocent man. I am guilty of the murder of that young girl."

20 Employees Blown to Pieces. The "Powder" Mills at Fair Chance, near Conestoga, Pa., blew up at 3 o'clock Saturday morning.

NEW YORK LIFE INQUIRY.

Sold \$800,000 of Stock and Bought It Back Next Day.

Mr. Hughes Drew From Him the Statement That the Transaction Was to Enable Company to Make a Favorable Report to the Superintendent of Insurance.

New York, Sept. 13.—Selling \$800,000 in bonds one day and buying them back the next but one, a holiday intervening, in order to keep within statements made in the New York Life Insurance company's report to the superintendent of insurance, was the sensational disclosure made at the session of the legislative insurance investigating committee.

The fact was drawn from Edmund D. Randolph, treasurer of the New York Life Insurance company, late in the day, after Attorney Charles E. Hughes, of counsel to the committee, had labored for over an hour to get a direct answer from Mr. Randolph to a direct question.

Earlier in the day Mr. Randolph had handed Mr. Hughes a schedule of syndicate underwritings and transactions of the New York Life for the last 12 months. This was to show, and as a footnote to the schedule stated, that the company had participated in no syndicate transactions that had been closed out with a loss.

Mr. Hughes drew from the witness that there was an aggregate of \$7,000,000 of the New York Life sold to J. P. Morgan & Co. on the "joint account."

Mr. Hughes then took up a sales item dated Dec. 31, 1903, of \$800,000 of International Mercantile Marine stock. Mr. Randolph replying to Mr. Hughes, said this sale was made to J. P. Morgan & Co. Mr. Hughes continued his inquiry into the matter, and asked:

"On Jan. 2, 1904, there is an entry of a purchase of \$800,000. From whom did you buy it?"

"J. P. Morgan & Co."

"Why did you sell to J. P. Morgan and then buy from J. P. Morgan & Co. on the next business day?"

"Because they desired to reduce it."

"Yes, but why, then, did you buy it back the next business day?"

Mr. Randolph's explanation apparently did not please Mr. Hughes, who finally said:

"Who sold the shares for the New York Life?"

"Mr. Perkins."

"Who bought them again?"

"An officer of the company."

"Who was it?"

"Mr. Perkins."

"As a matter of fact, there was a report to the superintendent of insurance on Dec. 31, 1903?"

"Yes."

"Then the sole purpose of the transaction was that you might be able to tell the superintendent of insurance you held only \$3,200,000 of International Mercantile Marine shares?"

The witness hesitated, but Mr. Hughes repeated the question until finally Mr. Randolph said: "Yes."

Usefulness of Trust Company. The usefulness of the New York Security and Trust company to the New York Life came out when it was testified that while the insurance company was not taking collateral loans, it made a practice of lending its money to the trust company, who made the collateral loans.

Mr. Hughes took up the accounts of the money deposited with the New York Security and Trust company in 1902, which was called Account No. 4. It ran from \$6,750,000 in May and June up to \$12,531,000 in September and ended at well over \$10,000,000 in December.

"Now," said Mr. Hughes, "why did you reduce the amount deposited with the New York Security and Trust company in July, 1904, to \$2,500,000 and keep it at that even figure to the end of the year? Your balance at the beginning was \$8,000,000?"

Mr. Randolph professed ignorance of the impossibility of remembering every transaction, and interrupted again and again.

Mr. Hughes begged the witness to refrain from "general conversation," and repeated the question. Mr. Randolph finally said:

"There was a question at this time whether our relations would continue with the company. The consolidation of the New York Security and Trust company was taking place at this time."

"Now prior to the end of 1901, the trustees of the New York Security and Trust company held 6,000 shares; that is a majority of the 10,000 shares?"

"Yes."

"Well, in March, 1904, when the total stock of the company was increased to 30,000 shares, were the holdings of the trustees increased?"

SHORTER NEWS ITEMS.

A dispatch from Tokio announces a bloody battle on the island of Sakhalin. The Japanese administered a crushing defeat to the remnant of the Russian troops on the island after five hours' fighting.

A mob burned and destroyed 10 Christian churches and one mission school at Tokio.

Three hundred drivers of United States mail wagons strike at New York for higher wages and because they claim the bosses have failed to keep agreement.

FAIRBANKS IN THE PULPIT.

Delivered an Address on Prayer at Valley Forge Memorial Chapel.

President Fairbanks, while visiting Valley Forge, Sunday afternoon, Philadelphia, made a speech from which he said that it is his belief that the nation is in an auto-mobility which is under a great deal of stress.

He took for his theme the value of prayer, and pointed to the recognition of its efficacy by Washington, by Lincoln and by McKinley during the wars of their times. He said that it is his belief that a memorial chapel should be erected on this sacred spot.

It was the vice president's first visit to the historic camp ground.

Fewer Births Than Deaths in City. Pittsburg, Sept. 11.—A table of the births and deaths in Pittsburg during the last 14 days, prepared by City Physician Booth, shows a startling decrease in the number of births, notwithstanding a large increase in population.

In 1891 there were 1,091 births, the rate per thousand being 28.51. In the same year there were 5,232 deaths, the rate per thousand being 128.1. In 1904 the birth rate was only 21.74, while the death rate was 12.78.

The figures for the first three months of this year are surprising. In 1901 the excess of births over deaths was 1,245. The figures for this year indicate that there were 23 fewer births than deaths.
